

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<u>We Cancerve</u> was started in 2011 to help <u>homeless</u>, <u>sick</u> and <u>foster</u> children. These <u>kids</u>, like our founder <u>Grace</u>, find themselves in sad situations that they can't control. So Grace and her all-youth board of advisors give children <u>school</u> <u>clothes</u>, after-school <u>snacks</u>, toiletries like <u>soaps</u> and shampoos, and all kinds of gifts to help them be <u>happy</u>.

Our founder had <u>Lymphoma</u>; it's a kind of <u>cancer</u>. She was treated at <u>Sinai Hospital</u> in <u>Baltimore</u>. Her doctor is awesome. He likes people to call him <u>Yoram</u>, his first name, but I like to call him Dr. <u>Unguru</u>. During her cancer treatment, Grace had lots of support from <u>family</u> and <u>friends</u>. The principal, teachers, staff and classmates at <u>William S. James</u> elementary school and people from the <u>community</u> sent her well wishes. Her church family, <u>Ames U.M.C.</u>, fixed her dinners, sent her cards and came to visit her at home. Throughout her cancer journey, Grace wanted to <u>play</u> and have <u>fun</u>. Sometimes, she would have fun in the hospital. She liked to ride on her <u>IV pole</u>. Sometimes, she decorated her IV pole with a pillow case and decorate the pillow case with stickers, feathers and markers. She now shares that fun with other hospitalized children in a project she calls <u>TransFUNers</u>. She also received lots of <u>toys</u> during cancer journey; most of the toys she received came from the wish fairy at the Give Kids the World <u>resort</u> who left surprises for her every day while she was in Florida at <u>Disney World</u>. She shared most of those toys with homeless children. She also shared toys she received from the gift fairy at <u>Believe in Tomorrow</u>; it's a great organization that gives sick children free getaways to places like <u>Ocean City</u> or the mountains in West Virginia. Another great organization is <u>Casey Cares</u>; Grace got to attend her first Orioles game thanks to tickets they shared with Grace's family.

Giving to others is very rewarding. We hope you join a community service project and help others in need.
